Each year, more than 23 million Americans have their packages stolen and thousands of customers have filed complaints according to Consumer Affairs. Please consider taking preventative measures avoid your Amazon, Ebay, UPS, Fed Ex or USPS package from being stolen from your front door.

Listed below are preventive measures or alternatives to prevent package thefts from your residence:

- Use smart package lockers at stores to secure a package
- Have packages delivered to a workplace
- Install a front door security camera or surveillance system
- Require a signature for delivery
- Require a vacation package hold
- Insure your packages

Please be aware of your surroundings and report suspicious activity by dialing 911 or 415-553-0123 if it is not an emergency.

Each month Taraval Police Station features one of its officers in an effort to learn more about the men and women who police our neighborhood. This month, we interviewed Officer Wayne Lok.



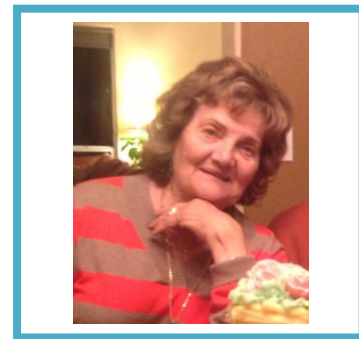
Our School Resource Officer – Wayne Lok

Through these meetings we became aware of the Citizens Academy and took the 15 week course and upon the completion we came away with a greater understanding of and support of our Police Department. We then became volunteers for the Police Academy and our Taraval Station available to help at various police events. Definition of Suspicious Activity

Suspicious activity is any observed behavior that could indicate a crime-related incident has been committed, or about to be committed. Unusual items or situations: A vehicle is parked in an odd location, a package/luggage is unattended, a window/door is open that is usually closed, or other out-of-the-ordinary situations occur.

Examples of Suspicious Activity:

- ◆ An individual peering into vehicles, to try, and locate any valuables left unattended.
- ◆ An individual trying door handles to vehicles, and/or residences to gain access to the vehicle and/ or residence.
- ◆ An individual checking front doors of residences to locate any unattended packages or individuals following delivery trucks to see where the truck is dropping off packages.

Definition of Community Policing

Community policing, or community-oriented policing, is a strategy of policing that focuses on police building ties and working closely with members of the communities.

- Homeless Outreach and Outreach to Drug Users: Taraval Station has two officers that coordinate with city agencies to provide outreach and assistance to rehabilitate those who are dependent on illegal drugs and outreach to homeless individuals to connect them with resources and support.
- Foot Patrols: Taraval Station has 3 foot beat locations. These officers are assigned to Irving St, West Portal Ave and Ocean Ave.
- Monthly Police Community Relations Meetings: Community Meetings are going to be held continuously. Officers and sergeants also attend meetings with merchants groups, business groups, development authorities and others. Concerns are voiced and addressed through problem solving.
- Email Updates: Taraval Station will send out newsletter updates to residents in the District that alerts residents of crime trends, upcoming community events, crime prevention tips, and information on how to contact officers at the District Station.



Definition of Crimes

Robbery – Robbery is the taking of property from another by using force or by using fear.

Assault – An assault is an unlawful attempt, couple with the present ability, to commit a violent injury on another person.

Battery – (**Misdemeanor Battery**) is any willful and unlawful touching of another.
(**Felony Battery**) is the use of force or violence up the person of another that causes serious bodily injuries.

*Assault is when a person swings their arm at a person and battery is when that arm makes contact with the person.

Aggravated Assault- Assault upon another person with a deadly weapon or instrument other than a firearm or by any means of force likely to produce great bodily injury.

Burglary – The intent to enter a property to commit a grand theft, petty, theft or any felony.

Grand Theft – Grand theft is theft committed when the value of the money, labor, or property taken that exceeds \$950.

Petty Theft – Theft where the value of the property taken is less than \$950.



Incident of Note

Assault, Aggravated W/Knife

On Saturday, 12-2-17, Officers Hoang #1861 and Juarez #4140 responded to 1051 Ocean Ave regarding a stabbing incident. Officers arrived at Beep's Burgers parking lot and discovered a hostile person with blood on his hands and clothes. The scene was chaotic with a large crowd forming. Officers called for assistance and waited for help to make entry into the crowd to determine what happened. Once additional officers arrived on scene, (victim) was treated for a laceration to his left hand and ultimately transported to SFGH for treatment. Through the preliminary investigation, it was determined that the (suspect), drove into the parking lot at a high rate of speed. An argument ensued and suspect exited his vehicle holding a knife in his hands waving it at people. (Victim) was able to grab (suspect) from behind and get the knife away from (suspect) but sustained a laceration to his left hand. (Suspect), who was still on scene inside his vehicle, was detained and subsequently arrested for N/W 245pc and 148pc.

When the cell phone was taken from her, she sustained an injury to her right middle finger and pushed to the ground. (Suspect) was still on scene and gave a statement to officers. (Suspect) stated that he was being filmed by (Victim) as he walked into Luckys and didn't want (victim) to film him. He grabbed the phone from her and walked away. (Suspect) booked for N/W 211 PC.

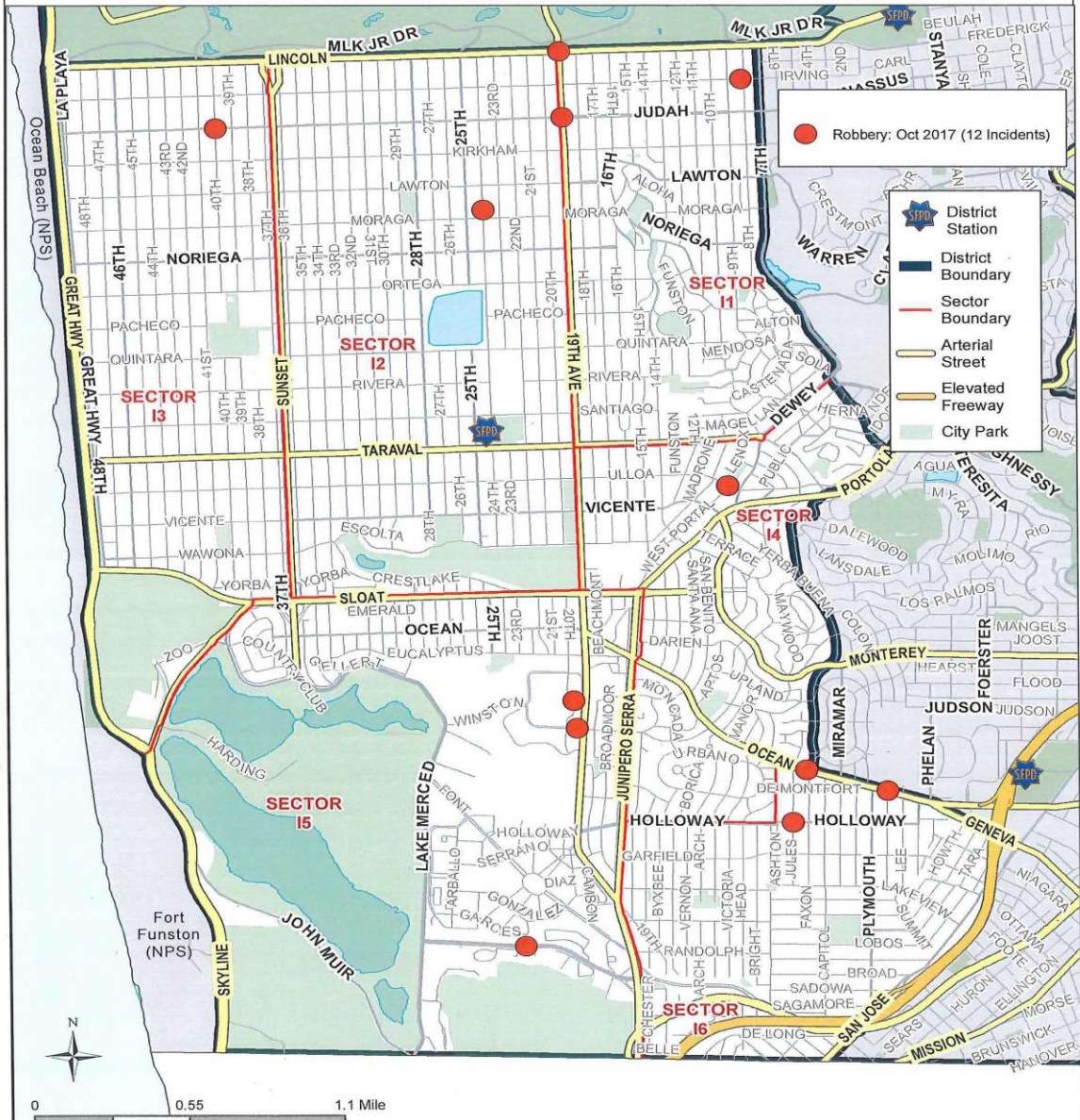

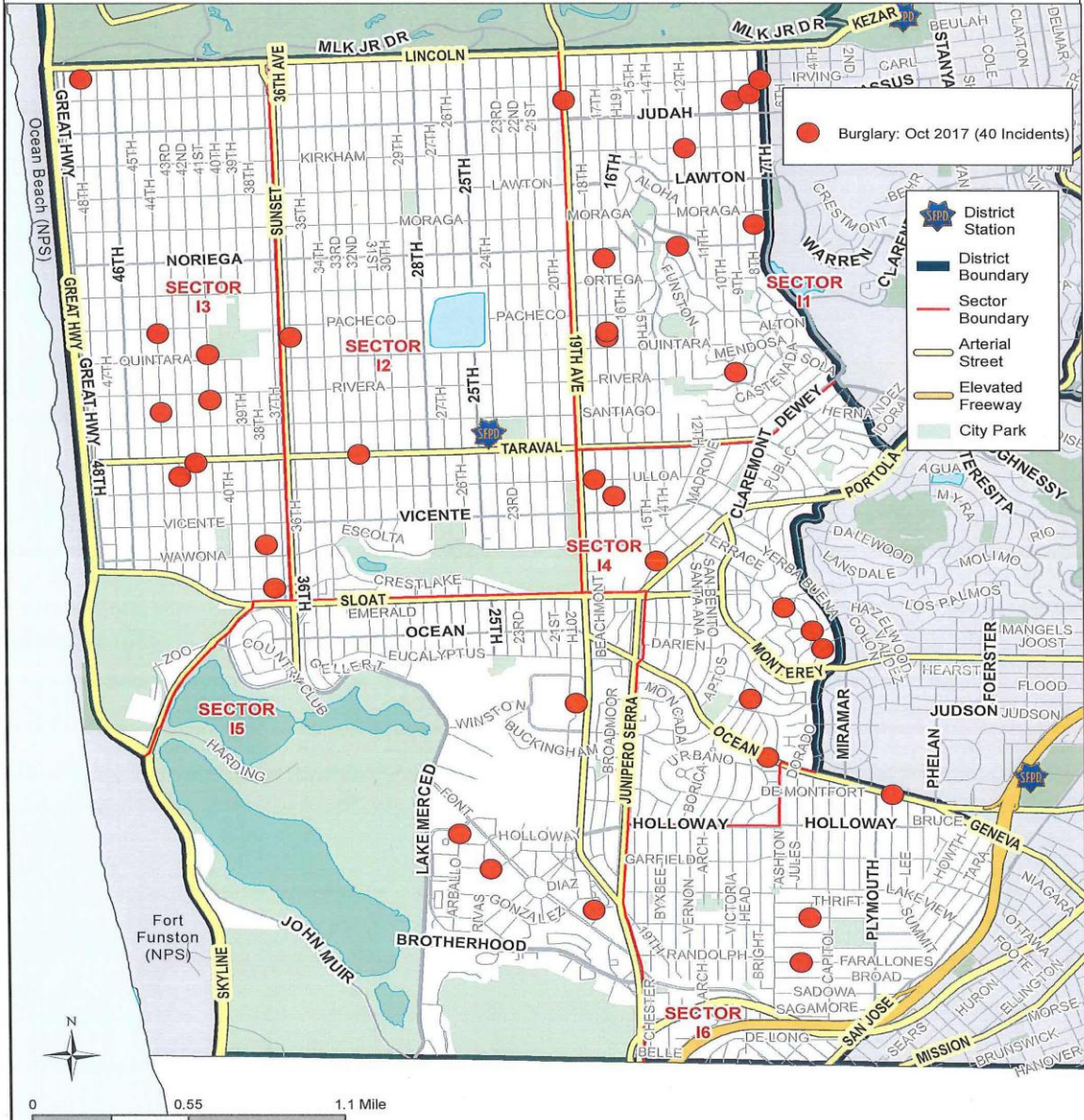

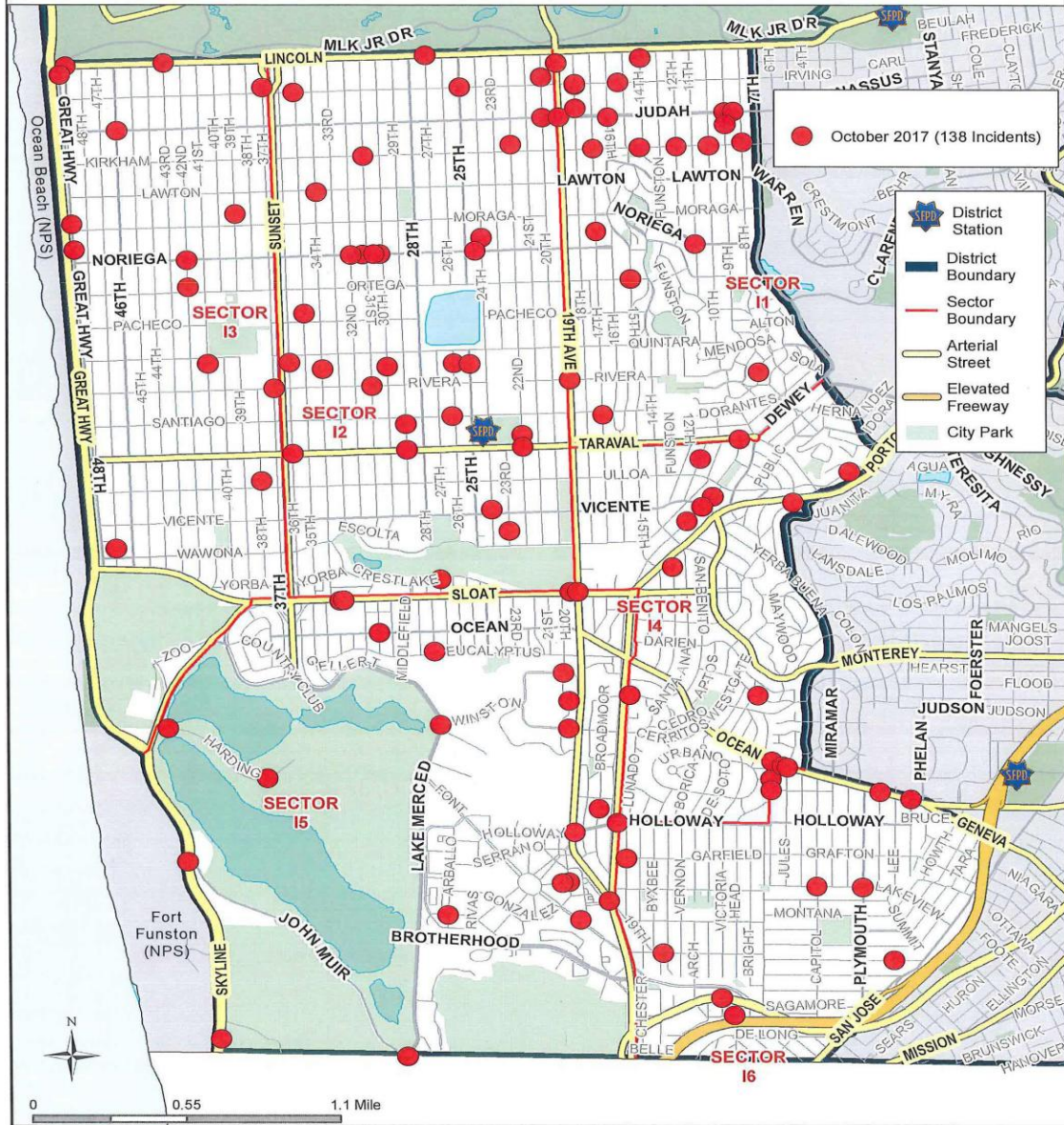

CREDIT CARDS

- Shop Only at Secure Websites
- Do Not Respond to Emails Asking You for Personal or Credit Card Information
- Check Your Credit Card & Bank Statements Regularly for Fraudulent Use



 Be alert and aware of your surroundings at all times. Alert security if you notice any of the following in any public space:

- Unattended packages
- Persons exhibiting erratic or nervous behaviors
- People wearing bulky or inappropriate clothing which may be used to conceal threatening devices or objects
- Suspicious chemical smells or pungent odors
- Anyone tampering with surveillance cameras

Safe Shopper 2017 - Holiday Season Safety Tips

During this holiday season, the San Francisco Police Department will be working to enhance safety for residents, visitors and shoppers. There will be increased foot patrols in shopping areas throughout the city, including the horse/mounted unit, plainclothes officers and traffic enforcement.

“The men and women of the San Francisco Police Department wish everyone a safe and joyful holiday season,” said Chief William Scott. “Whether you’re shopping for gifts or going about your daily routine, it’s important to remain careful and aware to prevent theft. Follow our tips to help keep you and your belongings safe.”

- Stay alert when using electronic devices. Limit your distractions.
- Always be alert to your surroundings and have your keys in your hand as you approach your vehicle.
- Park Smart: Help avoid vehicle break-ins, leave nothing visible in your car. Consider moving your vehicle to a different location each time you load packages in the trunk. Try to use parking lots where there are parking attendants.
- Keep your wallet in a hard-to-reach place and carry only the cash and credit cards that you will need to complete your shopping.
- If someone demands your purse, wallet, or packages, surrender them, make note of the suspect’s description and direction they flee and call 911. Property can be replaced.
- If you see something, say something. If you witness criminal activity or see something or someone suspicious, flag down a police officer, call 911 or contact security.
- Use 311 to report auto burglaries.
- Shop with a companion, especially after dark, whenever possible.
- Shield your PIN when using ATMs or other electronic devices in public.
